#### Solar Eclipse Safety April 8, 2024 As the moon aligns perfectly between Earth and the parts of Ontario will experience temporary darkness Use the advice below to stay safe during the eclipse Looking directly at the uncovered Sun without protection can cause retinal burns, blurred vision, or loss of eyesight. There are no pain sensors in your retinas to tell you that your eyes are being damaged. Once symptoms begin, the damage is usually too late to reverse. **Quick facts** The eclipse is expected to start just after 2:00 p.m. EDT with a full eclipse from approximately 3:20 p.m. and move eastward. The specific time and duration of the eclipse will depend on your location. Areas outside the path of totality will observe a partial solar eclipse. Historically, eclipses have prompted mass movements of people to prime viewing areas. Check your municipality's website for service changes and local closures. 

## **HOW TO STAY SAFE**

### WHEN A FLOOD THREATENS









Listen to authorities for information

Be aware that snakes and other

animals may be in your house. Wear heavy gloves and boots during clean up.

Sign up for your community's warning system. The Emergency Alet System (EAS) and National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) Weather Radio also provide emergency alerts.

If flash flooding is a risk in your location, monitor potential signs as heavy rain.

Learn and practice evacuation routes, shelter plans, and flash flood response.

Gather supplies in case you have to Gather supplies in case you have to leave immediately or if services are cut off. Keep in mind each person's specific needs, including medication. Don't forget the needs of pets. Obtain extra batteries and charging devices for phones and other critical equipment.

Obtain flood insurance. Homeow policies do not cover flooding. Ge flood coverage under the Nationa Flood Insurance Program (NFIP). oding. Get

Keep important documents in a waterproof container. Create password-protected digital copies.

Protect your property. Move valued nems to higher levels. Declutter drains and gutters. Install check valves. Consider a sump pump with a battery. Depending on where you are, and the impact and the warning time of flooding, go to the safe location that you have identified.

If told to evacuate, do so immediately. Never drive around barricades. Local responders use to safely direct traffic out of flood

Listen to EAS, NOAA Weather
